

Introduction to the Frimley Health and Care System

The Frimley System

The Frimley health and care planning footprint, see map, is the population of **750,000 people** registered with General Practitioners in five CCG areas: Slough, NHS Windsor, Ascot & Maidenhead; Bracknell & Ascot; Surrey Heath and North-East Hampshire and Farnham.



Partners in the Frimley System

The Frimley system is complex, operating across three Counties and encompassing a wide variety of community, mental health and social care services.

We are made up of 30 Statutory Bodies including:

- 5 x NHS Commissioners (CCG's)
- 1 x Acute care provider (FHFT)
- 5 x Mental health and community providers
- 5 x GP Federations and 2 x GP Out of Hours Providers
- 2 x County Councils (including Public Health)
- 3 x Unitary Authorities (including Public Health)
- 5 x District and Borough Councils

Update

- All work streams are meeting regularly to understand the patch and develop action plans for the future
- Financial planning and bids
 - Joint bid applications to ensure money is allocated where there is the greatest need
 - Equality of services across the STP, eg, 8-8 GP access
 - Already successful in first round of bids, eg, £1million towards diabetes services across the STP

Accountable Care Systems

- National move towards thinking about **Accountable Care Systems** – various features in the news
- Important to see ‘accountable care’ as means to end
- ACSs are a way of describing mature partnerships
- Partners come together to make single, consistent decisions about resources for health & care
- Partners take collective responsibility for managing a financial system control total
- ACSs need clear plans – plus capacity & capability to execute plans – for delivering improvements in national priority areas
